

Travis Graves may have just proven he's the baddest cat in the free world when it comes to heelers. Graves kicked off the month of March with a win at The American, good for \$100,000, spent the next week in Guthrie, Oklahoma at the Timed Event Championships, where he helped Trevor Brazile cash in \$100,000, then headed to San Antonio, where he and Clay Tryan bested the field at The Strait, earning over \$136,000 each. During the first three weekends in March, the Jay, Oklahoma team roper, who now resides in Morgan Mill, Texas, won roughly twice his 2014 PRCA earnings. Graves also picked up an additional \$34,080 for a fourth place win with Chad Masters.

Tryan, on the head end, is arguably the best jackpot header in the world. This was the Montana-native-turned-Lipan, Texas-resident's second trip to the George Strait winner's circle. He won the event in 2012 with Patrick Smith, joining the elite list of ropers who have claimed the championship multiple times...Jack Stephenson, Steve Purcella, Kory Koontz, Allen Bach, Tee Woolman, Jake Barnes, Speed Williams, Clay O'Brien Cooper and Jade Corkill.

The 33rd Annual George Strait Team Roping Classic was held March 13-14 at the San Antonio Rose Palace in San Antonio, Texas. The 2015 edition of the GSTRC drew 675 teams from across the country to compete in Friday's preliminary rounds, kicking off 18 hours of roping that would result in over \$740,000 in cash and prizes awarded.

The unique format of the GSTRC is not seen in any other major Open roping. Ropers pay \$1,000 per team to compete in two progressive preliminary rounds on Friday, with the top 50 on two head advancing to Saturday's finals (top five from each of 10 rotations). Saturday's roping features three full go rounds for the big money, but teams are starting from scratch. Since its inception and including this year, the George Strait Team Roping Classic has awarded cash and prizes approaching the \$5 Million mark.

Bragging rights this year for the fastest on Friday's two head belong to Levi Simpson and Jeremy Buhler, who received a pair of buckles for their 9.78 on two. Another two buckles were awarded to Clay Smith and Paul Eaves, who turned in the fastest time overall in the preliminary rounds, a

4.26.

Tryan and Graves entered the last round on Saturday in the number two position with just 1.5 seconds separating the top 10 teams. As they entered the box, Cord Crowell and Camish Jennings, the third high team, led the roping with a 14.38 on three head. The fastest time ever recorded on three head at the GSTRC was a 14.40, posted by Chad Masters and Jade Corkill in 2009. Crowell and Jennings had just bested the record by .2 seconds.

Needing a 4.61, Tryan and Graves went off on one for a 4.19 and the 13.95 on three head, breaking the average record for the second time in the span of a few minutes. They watched as the only team who could spoil the day, Derrick Begay and Cory Petska, suffered a no-time, leaving the championship trucks and trailers to Tryan and Graves.



Levi Simpson and Jeremy Buhler roped the fastest two steers on Friday, turning in a time of 9.78. They also picked up eighth place in the final average.

The champs split \$272,640 in cash, that's about \$19,500 per second, and each received a brand new Chevy crew-cab truck and matching Bruton trailer. Crowell and Jennings finished as the reserve champions, claiming a pair of saddles and over \$109,000.

A George Strait tradition continued this year in the form of red-wrapped steers. Steers in the draw are randomly wrapped with red horn wraps and are worth quite a bit of cash if one is roped in the fastest time of the round. If a red wrap is the winning time in the first round, a bonus of \$10,000 is paid to the winning team. If the fast time is not on a red wrapped steer, that cash carries over to the next round. A total of \$30,000 bonus money is available in Saturday's three rounds. This

year, Dustin Bird and Kollin VonAhn roped a 4.42 in the first round on a redwrapped steer, earning the \$10,000 cash bonus in addition to the \$3,000 go round prize. Cale Markham and Buddy Hawkins turned in a 4.68 in the second round for \$3,000, but Kaleb Driggers and Brazilian sensation, Junior Nogueira roped the fastest time of the weekend in the third round. Their 3.89 second run on a red wrapped steer was good for \$23,000.

In 1983, Strait and his late brother, Buddy hosted the first George Strait Team Roping in Kingsville, Texas. The grand prize for the 137 team event was a two-horse trailer. Almost \$5 million later, the event annually hosts close to 700 teams and has become the richest open roping in the universe.

As always, Strait himself was on hand to welcome ropers and present awards. He was joined in the arena between rounds Saturday by Lieutenant General Leroy Sisco, US Army Retired, to make a presentation on behalf of the Military Warriors Support Foundation Homes 4 Wounded Heroes. Sisco and Strait presented Corporal Leland Arledge, a Purple Heart recipient, and his wife Jennifer, a mortgage-free home in Hot Springs, Arkansas. This marked the 640th home, the 52nd by Strait, presented

through the MWSF to deserving military heroes.

In another presentation on Saturday, Strait was surprised by announcer Reed Flake, Dustin Noblitt of Pro Equine Group, Robert Lever of Wrangler, Louis Russo of Justin Boots, Ricky Bolin of Resistol, J.D. Yates and Dean Tuftin. The group presented a four-year-old AQHA mare, from Tuftin's ranch, to Strait in recognition of his passion for team roping the past 33 years. Tuftin said Strait had admired his horses in years past and made

the comment that he'd like to own one of them.

"It's been 33 years of fun," said Strait, upon hearing the total cash and prizes awarded by his event through the years. "I had no idea we'd given away so much. Time flies when you're having fun."

Keep having fun George, the ropers love it when you do. You've worn the crown, "King of Country Music" your entire career...I think it's safe to call you the "King of Team Roping" now.

George Strait Honored at AMC 50th Anniversary Award Celebration

At the 50th Academy of Country Music Awards at AT&T Stadium in Arlington, TX, George Strait was one of only seven artists to receive the prestigious 50th Anniversary Milestone Award commemorating groundbreaking career achievements in ACM Awards history. Strait, who has won a total of 21 ACM Awards over the course of four consecutive decades, took home his first Entertainer of the Year trophy in 1989 and repeated the feat 24 years later in 2013. He has also been honored with the ACM's 40th Anniversary Milestone Award in 2005 and was named the ACM Dick Clark Artist of the Decade for the 2000's.
