The George Strait Team Roping Classic, recognized by everyone as one of he most prestigious events in the sport, as been set for July 7th and 8th at the San Antonio Rose Palace in San Antonio, Texas. The 2000 event, for the first time, will focus exclusively on Team Roping as 10 concert will take place.

As usual, many of the greatest ropers in he country are expected to attend the George Strait Team Roping Classic as several hundred teams should register by the June 27th deadline. Team Ropers can regster on June 26th and 27th from 5-10 p.m. by calling 210-698-9251. The entry fee is \$400 per team and each roper will be able to enter up to three times, each with a different partner. An estimated prize package of more than \$150,000 is expected to be up for grabs. The winning

team, in addition to their cash earnings, will drive away in Chevy Truck twin cab duly pickups pulling new Bruton Trailers. The second place team will receive saddle and cash while the third place team will get their cash and Team Roping Classic buckles.

Coliseum Concert Scores, First Music Event Pulls 50,000 Fans

The first music event in Adelphia
Coliseum was more than just a concert.
It was more like the Tennessee Strait
Fair.

Oh, sure, the music — provided by George Strait, Tim McGraw, Martina McBride and others — was the focal point. But Straitland, a section west of the coliseum accessible to ticket-holders, offered plenty of diversions during the show, slated to last more than nine hours.

Straitland featured carnival food, such as corn dogs and funnel cakes; a small midway with a dart game and basketball toss; and numerous exhibit booths, where visitors could pick up U.S. Tobacco giveaways or get a temporary "Chevy Trucks" tattoo to go with their sunburns.

"It's a good way to pass the time till the main attraction," said Roxanne Bennett of Hohenwald, Tenn. "It kinda breaks up the day, so we don't feel like we're sittin'here for 10 hours."

More than 50,000 people showed up for the concert, the first test of the coliseum as a music venue. There were seemingly few complaints among concert-goers.

Bennett's friend Rachel Tiller was among the few naysayers. Seated on the main floor, she was unable to see either the stage or any of the three video screens that showed close-up images of Mark Chesnutt and Lee Ann Womack. People on their feet in front of her blocked her view, and security prevented fans from standing on their chairs.

"I'm over it," she lamented.

Others basked in the event, Kenny Chesney had the crowd on its feet, singing along to "She Thinks My Tractor's Sexy," "How Forever Feels" and a brief chorus of Jimmy Buffett's "Margaritaville." One couple slow-danced on the grass just outside the south end of the coliseum. Others rested in the shade under small trees with-

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n earshot of the music.

"We found out actually it's a very good concert venue," stadium general manager 3ill Dickerson said. "The way it was set ip, we've got a lot of power down back behind the stage. We've got about 3,200 mps, which is really unheard of in a renue such as ours. Most of the time (the icts) have to bring in generators."

Fans who arrived early seemed satisfied with parking options. Those who trickled n later had farther to walk.

Unlike at Titans football games, where ans are generally insistent about arriving n time to see the opening kickoff, numerous ticketholders rolled in well after openng act Asleep at the Wheel took the stage. The coliseum also held fewer fans. While Titans games sell out at about 67,000 tickets, the stage yesterday was set on the northern end zone, eliminating seats behind it, as well as seven sections of seats on either concourse.

The 50,000-plus who did come yesterday were greeted with stiff prices. T-shirts were \$25, with one jersey going for \$45, and a Strait Windbreaker was selling for \$65. Beer was \$5, bottled water was \$3.

Jamie Strader of Kentucky predicted he and his wife would spend \$300-\$350 for the day. By contrast, John Murphy, 15, of Hopkinsville, KY, had spent \$4 for a drink and hoped he could minimize the rest of his spending.

"I'm tryin'to conserve on money," he said.

Stadium visitors might well have had to conserve their energy, too. The show began at 1 p.m. in bright, early summerish weather, and ran until just past 10 p.m.

Alan Jackson arrived around 3 p.m. and made an unannounced appearance later in the evening to sing "Murder On Music Row" with Strait. And Faith Hill arrived with her husband, Tim McGraw.

With many concert-goers visiting the coliseum for the first time, the Strait fair had plenty of them sold — not just on the music, but also on the venue.

"I'll be back for a football game, probably," Bennett beamed.

Strait And Crew Rev Up Crowd At The Speedway

More than 55,000 people died and went
o country music heaven Saturday night.
Actually, they went to the George Strait
Country Music Festival at Lowe's Motor
Speedway. Given an entire day of toplight music and a great party atmosphere,
his was as close to bliss as a two-stepper
s going to get on this Earth.

You want a moment that captures one of he biggest one-night concert stands in Charlotte musical history?

It's pouring down rain as Kenny Chesney breaks into his signature hit. 'She Thinks My Tractor's Sexy." Instead of running for cover, Mark Bryant, 30, of Galax, Va., doesn't get any better than this as he stomps his cowboy boots into 2 inches of rain puddles. His black T-shirt pretty much said it all. "It's a blubba think. No body understands." Saturday's festival opened the summer ong George Strait series of Woodstock-

tyle festivals that included a second con-

cert stage outside the speedway, country merchandise booths and enough music to make your ears ring.

Not even a late afternoon storm that left water and mud everywhere could douse the spirit of a crowd that had come to boogie. Rock concerts have mosh pits. This concert had a mud pit where men slid across the infield grass and a few women mud wrestled.

During Chesney's performance, two women stripped down to their bathing suits, then put back on their jeans and raincoats, while an admiring man behind them gave them a high five when they were done.

The lines for the lady's restroom went forever. The concourse under the stands was a constant traffic jam. The police and emergency officials reported only minor problems. The crowd was too much into music and fun to cause trouble.

There was even a marriage proposal right after Lee Ann Womack's entertaining set.

The woman accepted.

Among those who performed on the 300-foot-long stage erected on pit row was Womack, Mark Chestnut, the band Asleep at the Wheel and Chesney, who may have been the surprise hit of the day with a high-energy set that gave the crowd what it wanted — a lot of fast stuff.

The big three of the day, though, came on after the rain stopped and the temperatures cooled.

Martina McBride, in tight black leather pants, ran through all her hits, getting the biggest rise out of the crowd on the faster ones.

"Independence Day," her signature song, revved up the crowd, as did "Wild Angels" and a great cover of an old Johnny Nash rock hit, "I Can See Clearly Now."

Tim McGraw followed her to the stage, also in black leather pants and also juicing up the crowd with his faster hits.

"Down on the Farm" got a redneck roar going. During "Just to See You Smile," a

woman standing on two chairs shrieked, 'He's a man, he's a man."

He got his biggest reaction near the end of his set with his trademark lyric. "I like t, I love it, I want some more of it."

The sound system was strong enough to each the farthest edges of the crowd high ip in the speedway stands. But this was ess a night about precision music than it was a stomping, good country music time. The star of the show came last, around

8:30 p.m., when Strait took the stage. Nearly eight hours after the music cranked up, the sun and the temperature

cranked up, the sun and the temperature having gone down, Strait ran through a pure country set of his greatest hits.

Wearing blue jeans instead of black leather, and dispensing with small talk, he opened with "The Fireman" and never let up.

His band was tight. He seemed to be loving the opening night of the tour, and he gave the crowds all that it came for — from "The Chair" to "Write This Down" to his signature song, "Heartland."

A lyric from "Heartland" pretty much summed up Straitland: "Country music on a Saturday night brings a smile to your face and tear to your eye."

If all this sounds just too cool, take heart. You still have time to make it to Nashville tonight for the next Straitland.


The George Strait Fan Club is happy to present the 2nd full life-size stand up of George Strait.
